Junior faculty members get a chance to meet experts and learn from them by listening to their life time experiences over a cup of tea or a lunch plate.

So conventional physical conferences should continue to be conducted if the environment of favorable to have a feeling of fairness of learning new things, exchanging knowledge and expanding our world of wisdom.....!

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
